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INVESTING IN LOCAL COMMUNITIES: Co-op awards grants

One of the core values of Slope Electric Cooperative is commitment to the communities and members it serves, through sponsorships, grants and participation in community events.

The Rural Development Finance Corporation (RDFC) grant demonstrates the true meaning of commitment by awarding funds to local cooperatives, such as Slope Electric, which are then passed on to community entities.

Earlier this year, Slope Electric received a \$3,000 grant allocation from RDFC to benefit its service area. Slope Electric awarded funds to the City of Bowman, Lemmon Lions Club, Mott Lions Club and Slope County Economic Development Corporation.

City of Bowman

Bowman is home to around 1,470 residents and is a busy rural community from high school events to the county fair. A busy community such as this needs a responsive team of fire, ambulance and **Slope Electric Cooperative**

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police departments. With the RDFC funds, the city of Bowman plans to purchase Statewide Interoperable Radio Network (SIRN) compliant radios for safe, rapid communication between the city workforce and responders.

"The SIRN system will be our best form of communication with North Dakota State Radio and will help make response time quicker for our police officers," says Peggy Allen, Bowman City Financial Auditor. "This updated technology will help contribute to our community's safety."

Within the next year, emergency response teams will have to update their systems to adhere to SIRN compliance. The other radio channels currently used will not be available for state communication.

Lemmon Lions Club

Lemmon is a rural town with helpful organizations such as the Lemmon Lions Club. The Lemmon Lions Club works with Delta Dental of South Dakota to bring a mobile dental office to Lemmon. This gives children an opportunity to be seen by a dentist and get X-rays, cleanings and fillings addressed. In March, children were seen and received necessary treatments by the mobile dental office. RDFC funds will be used toward funding the mobile dental office.

Mott Lions Club

Lions Clubs are community pillars in various communities across the nation. The sole purpose of a Lions Club is to serve its community. A resounding example is the Mott Lions Club. Each year, the club puts together holiday food baskets to help those in need within the Mott community. RDFC funds will be used toward purchasing food for the baskets.

"The club has been putting together these baskets for over 25 years," says Mott Lions Club member Maggie Banyai. "It started with a few items per basket and has grown over time."

The baskets this year will contain kitchen basics such as sugar, flour and other nonperishable items. They also aim to include a protein in the basket as well. The number of baskets created depends on the amount of funds the Mott Lions Club raises.

The club checks with the school, churches and other community members to choose recipient families. Those who receive baskets are grateful.

Banyai says a majority of the notes they receive say, "Thank you for thinking of us."

Slope County Economic Development Corporation

Marmarth is nestled in the southwestern part of the state and is Slope County's largest town. The town has a rich history of dinosaurs to the railroad. The Slope County Economic Development Corporation (EDC) is planning an upgrade to the Marmarth City Park. RDFC funds will help get the project going, says Brandi Marum, Slope County economic developer.

"Our first goal is to reseed," Marum says. "We have a group who has volunteered to help us with the landscaping."

Other projects that may be incorporated as the project progresses are a picnic area, updated signage and playground equipment.

"The park used to be so well utilized by the town, and we want to make it the main focus again," Marum says.

RDFC grant funds are awarded to electric cooperatives in the spring of the year and applications are gathered by the cooperative. The cooperative board of directors then reviews the applications before the applications are approved by RDFC. To learn more about the RDFC grant process, visit https://slopeelectric.coop/rdfc.

\$1,000 Basin Electric Power Cooperative scholarship

Slope Electric will award a \$1,000 scholarship sponsored by Basin Electric. The scholarship will be awarded to a high school senior or college freshman already enrolled or planning to enroll in a full-time graduate or undergraduate program, and who is a dependent of a Slope Electric member. The student must attend an accredited two- or four-year program, university or vocational/tech school. A completed application is required.

Lineworker scholarship from 3C Construction

Slope Electric will award a \$500 scholarship sponsored by 3C Construction. Eligible students are high school seniors who are enrolled in a certified vocational or technical school pursuing a career as a lineworker and who are dependents of a Slope Electric member. A completed application is required.

Mechanic scholarship from West Dakota Utility Services

Slope Electric will award a \$500 scholarship sponsored by WDUS. Eligible students are high school seniors who are enrolled or planning to enroll in a certified vocational or technical school pursuing a career as a mechanic, and who are dependents of a Slope Electric member. A completed application is required.

Luck-of-the-draw scholarship

Slope Electric will award two \$500 and three \$1,000 luck-of-the-draw scholarships at the annual meeting. Anyone enrolled or planning to enroll part time or full time at an accredited two- or four-year program, university or vocational/tech school and is in attendance at the annual meeting is eligible. If a student is under 18 years old, his or her parent or guardian, who is a Slope Electric member, must be in attandance.

MESSAGE FROM OPERATIONS: Review of 2024

Throughout 2024, Slope **Electric Cooperative crews** worked to improve system reliability by maintaining and upgrading electrical infrastructure, such as poles and substations. Before work begins each year, the engineering staff at the Innovative Energy Alliance Cooperative, a cooperative we are member-owners of, develops a work plan using historical information from pole testing and line patrol as well as priorities from our operations team.

This year, crews changed out poles, installed new services and conducted substation maintenance.

At the start of the year, Slope Electric line technicians conducted line patrol and made preparations for spring construction. In addition, crews were available for storm restoration or mutual aid. We were able to assist other cooperatives during the new year, as Slope Electric sent a few lineworkers to assist Dakota Valley Electric Cooperative and KEM Electric Cooperative in the southeastern part of the state after an extreme ice storm.

Once the ground thawed in the spring, crews began to change out hundreds of poles identified as needing to be replaced due to factors such as age and clearance issues. Spring and summer are a busy time for crews, as they also work to upgrade and install services for homes, pasture wells, grain storage and oil production. To ensure substations receive, transform and distribute electrical services in a safe, efficient manner across the service territory, inspections, testing and maintenance were also completed.

With the dry summer and fall, the Slope Electric crews had minimal summer outages due to thunderstorms, but did have a few fire restoration projects. Due to the extremely dry conditions, crews took extra precautions to prevent fires while out working around the service area. Each cooperative vehicle, including the line trucks, are equipped with fire suppression gear and line crews are informed about its use.

- Remember to test your smoke alarms often due to increased cooking and candle enjoyment this time of year.

'Tis the season for savings

• The thermostat is one of the best places for savings, since heating and cooling make up the majority of home energy consumption. Lower the thermostat a few degrees, especially when you have family or friends stopping by.



- Decorate with LED holiday lights. LEDs are the most energy-efficient lighting options available, and they last much longer than traditional bulbs.
- When cooking this holiday season, remember smaller countertop appliances, such as air fryers and slow cookers, consume a fraction of the energy used to heat an oven.
